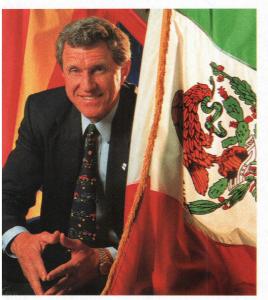
Strengthening Ties With Mexico
