greeting, an uplifting word."



Spare The Drug, Beat The Bug

Alternatives to Treat Children's Ear Infections

f you're a parent, chances are you've been through an ear infection with your child. In my practice, I see at least one child with an ear infection almost every day, through every season.

In the future, we expect the American Academy of Pediatrics and the American Academy of Family Physicians to urge doctors nationwide to stop using antibiotics to treat most children's ear infections.

The fact is, most ear infections get better just as quickly and as well without antibiotics. The best treatment is usually pain relief and careful observation, with followup calls or a second office visit when necessary.

While the Infection Runs Its Course

The pain in some 60 to 80 percent of ear infections will disappear on its own within 48 hours. If your child does have an ear infection, provide comfort while the infection runs its course.

- 1. Give your child acetaminophen, ibuprofen or pain medicine prescribed by your doctor.
- 2. Apply heat to the side of the head (e.g., a hot water bottle or heating pad).
- 3. Flush the affected ear with warmed mineral or vegetable oil (use only if there is no blood or pus in the ear canal) or a highly concentrated sugar solution.

new guidelines are intended to help stem the rise of antibiotic resistant bacteria. Antibiotics have been so overused that our available arsenal of infectionfighters is becoming less and less effective.

Instead of prescribing antibiotics for every child with pain and redness of the ear drum, doctors will reserve the drugs to treat only those with certain clearly defined risk factors: recurring ear infections, age younger than two, fever accompanying possible infection, severe pain, spending time in daycare, and exposure to cigarette smoke.

Questions About the Medicare Drug Benefit?

The full Medicare prescription drug benefit starts January 1, 2006. Until then, Medicare is contracting with private companies to offer drug discount cards. You should talk to your pharmacist before you enroll in any Medicare-endorsed prescription card program to help you select the Medicare-endorsed discount program that is best for you. Remember, beneficiaries can only enroll in ONE Medicare-endorsed discount card.

- This program is voluntary. There may be some eligibility requirements.
- Card sponsors will start enrollment in May 2004. The voluntary cards will be effective June 1, 2004 and will be offered until December 31, 2005.
- Beneficiaries can only enroll in ONE Medicare-endorsed discount card.
- Once you make your selection, you won't be able to change again until November 2004.

Berry Banana Smoothie



Split Pills Safely

You may be able to save money by pill splitting because some medications are the same price or only slightly more at a higher strength. But some pills are not made to split or do not split perfectly, even when using a "pill splitter." This could mean taking an incorrect dose. Furthermore, it can expose the pill to air and moisture, which can lessen its effectiveness. Overall, many medications can be safely split and more often than not, you will save money without negatively affecting your care. Check with your pharmacist about splitting the medications you are taking the next time you refill them.

- If a pill is not scored, do not split before talking to your doctor or pharmacist.
- Ask your pharmacist to split your pills or ask them to demonstrate the best way to split your pills.
- Find out if you will really save money by buying a higher dose and splitting.
- Use a pill splitter available at your pharmacy not a knife or your fingers.

Robot Joins Our Team

f you've visited the main Everett Clinic pharmacy recently, you may have noticed a new hire. This new "employee" is 6 1/2 feet tall, 13 1/2 feet wide, and weighs more than 1,600 pounds. The new addition is a robot called the SP 200 Robotic Prescription Dispensing System.

"The robot counts and fills up to 100 prescriptions per hour, so customers get their medications promptly, even during peak pharmacy hours," says Teri Ferreira, Director of Retail Pharmacy. A pharmacist makes the final check for complete accuracy, comparing the pills in the vial with a computer screen image of the drug. In its first day of operation, the robot dispensed 11,000 pills.

To make room for the robot, the main pharmacy has undergone a bit of a face-lift. Counters have been moved to increase work-flow efficiency, and privacy booths have been installed for pharmacists to talk to customers privately.

So the next time you need a prescription refill, stop by and visit our robot.




Treating Chronic Sinus Problems
